The Impact of Tax Reform on KEC

President Trump signed the "Tax Cuts and Jobs Act" into law on December 22, 2017. The legislation includes substantial changes to the taxation of individuals as well as U.S. businesses, multi-national corporations and other types of taxpayers. You may be wondering: how will the new tax reform impact KEC? Our new Chief Financial Officer, Reed Christensen, addresses some questions below:

What impact will the Act have on not-for-profit electric utilities like KEC?

The good news is the Act maintained the current tax treatment for not-for-profit electric cooperatives. As a not-for-profit, we are a tax-exempt entity as long as we abide by certain rules. None of these underlying rules changed in the recently signed Act. There were some rule changes in terms of limiting deductions on interest expense to 30% of taxable income, but these rules impact taxable, or for-profit, electric cooperatives—which KEC is not. We Clear Power Lines to Protect You and Your Service

Trees add tremendous value to our homes and communities.

They are a source of beauty in our landscapes, provide food and shelter for people and wildlife, shade our communities, provide oxygen and offer a multitude of other benefits. However, trees growing near power lines present some real challenges. They can cause power outages, fuel fires and can be deadly to our employees and members when not properly managed.

The primary cause of blinks and power outages on KEC's electrical system is trees contacting power lines. This happens most often

during windy or snowy weather. Some outages last only a second, causing a momentary blink, while other outages can last much longer.

Reliability

We make every effort to provide you with safe and reliable electric service. At KEC we maintain a safe right-of-way of 15 feet of clearance on either side of the power lines. However, most of the trees that cause outages are not within our power line easements. While KEC has the authority to cut trees that grow within these easements, there are some restrictions that apply to trees growing beyond them. Before removing a tree growing outside our easement which threatens our power lines, landowner

permission is needed. Once we receive permission the trees will be removed at no cost to the member. Landowners who refuse to allow KEC to remove at-risk trees on their property which threaten our power lines will be notified in writing of their liability for damage those trees may cause.

Safety

Both the National Electric Safety Code and Idaho Statute 55-2402 require that we maintain a safe clearance zone around wires not only for public safety, but to ensure reliable electric service.

If you have a tree of concern on your property that could fall into a power line, please don't cut it down yourself. If it's a risk to our power lines, we will be happy to remove it at no cost. In the event it's not, we can help you identify a qualified arborist who can help you remove it. [1439732]

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debt instruments. We have borrowings that are not affected by the Act. However, going forward as of January 1, 2018, the Act did repeal Clean Renewable Energy Bonds, which was a tax-advantaged source of financing for new renewable energy projects. We used this source of funding for the Fighting Creek Landfill Gas Project, which was not affected by this. If the Cooperative were to ever consider doing another similar renewable energy site in the future, it would have to look elsewhere for funding, which assuredly would be more expensive.

Back Up Generators and On-Site Generation

For the safety of KEC employees and the public, we track where backup generators are installed on our system and require members who have installed generators to contact us (this requirement includes any on-site generation, including wind and solar).

Generators can cause serious safety problems if improperly installed and could cause injury to KEC workers and the general public. All backup generator installations should have a transfer switch installed in accordance with the requirements of the National Electric Code. Transfer switch installations must be inspected by the State Electrical Inspector and we request that members provide KEC with a copy of the State Electrical Permit for the transfer switch installation. Traditional transfer switches are wired into your home's electrical panel. An alternative is GenerLink™, a transfer switch installed behind your meter. When you connect a portable generator to GenerLink™ and start it up, GenerLink™ automatically disconnects from the electric utility grid preventing the possibility of back feed. This device is approved by KEC and installed by a licensed electrical contractor. Unlike traditional transfer switches that require you to pre-select circuits the generator will service, with GenerLink™ you have access to every circuit in your panel. You can run 120 or 240 volt appliances up to your generator's capacity. GenerLink™ gives you the flexibility to choose how you use your power. For more information contact Scott at 208.292.3209.
